



Virginia Celebrates the Sesquicentennial, 1863-2013

In 1863, Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation to free slaves in ten rebelling Confederate states. Just two years later, he pushed for the 13th Amendment to the United States Constitution, which successfully freed all slaves in America. The Sesquicentennial of the Emancipation Proclamation is a series of commemorative events designed to educate citizens and raise awareness of racial equality.

According to historians, in 1620, a Dutch man-of-war ship "landed 20 negroes for sale, which were the first of that kind that were carried into the country." The slave trade, which continued unabated for almost 400 years, was brutal and denigrating. It ultimately uprooted more than 12 million Africans from their homeland and scattered them to the far reaches of the Western Hemisphere.

January 1, 2013 marked the 150th anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. In Virginia, 2013 launched a three-year-long, statewide celebration to commemorate this historic event.
