Re: Site Selection for the Emancipation Proclamation Monument

Doug:

Thank you for allowing me to assist the Martin Luther King Commission in the selection of the Emancipation Proclamation Monument. I think Brown's Island is a great choice for the monument and each of the three potential sites have their advantages as well as disadvantages which are listed below. Please note that the quantity of each isn't reflective of the quality....one advantage may outweigh three disadvantages. And in some cases a disadvantage could be an advantage depending on how the monument is designed.

Site 1 (end of the 5th Street / pedestrian bridge):

Advantages:

- highest visibility
- major focal point for 5th Street and the bridge
- potentially a larger space which may allow for more options
- area is open, very few trees obstructing views

Disadvantages:

- existing sculpture must be removed
- high pedestrian traffic (less opportunity for 'reflecting')
- must be large to be in scale with the view/bridge

Site 2 (adjacent to canal):

Advantages:

- the difference in the two sidewalk elevations could present a unique opportunity (the picture is deceiving)
- it allows for the best opportunity for quietness and reflection
- can be viewed from across canal as well
- nice trees with shaded areas

Disadvantages:

- on a sloped site (could also be an advantage)
- somewhat out of sight....would need to be a destination
- limited space...reduced scale compared to the other sites



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
Site 3 (adjacent to river/train bridge):

Advantages:

- historically speaking, fits in well with the Civil War Center. Belle Isle, and the old train bridge (with the quotations from the evacuation fire
- large enough area to offer numerous possibilities
- visible and accessible without being the focal point
- depending on the design, this site offers the potential to be interactive or peaceful and tranquil
- defined area (sidewalks)

Disadvantages:

- two magnolias would probably need to be removed
- parts of the year its near the port-a-johns



There are two directions the Commission could go.

Option 1: The Commission picks Site A, B, or C:

This is the option where the Commission picks one of the three site and provides certain parameters to the artists. If the Commission has specific criteria in mind for the monument, certain sites work better than others. For instance, if the Commission wants it to be grand, larger than life and highly visible, then Site A (5th Street vista) is best. If the Commission wants it to be a place for reflection and tranquility then Site B (beside the canal) is best. Or if the Commission wants it to be a part of the existing Civil War history, then Site C (nearest the Civil War Center) is best suited. If the Commission has criteria and wants to share it with me, I'd be better able to make a recommendation.

Option 1 has the potential of limiting the creativity of the artist but is easier to evaluate the entries because you're comparing 'apples to apples.' However, providing a specific site can assure the entries are within the set boundaries and parameters.

Option 2: The Artist picks Site A, B or C:


This is the option that allows the artist to pick one of the three sites that are most appropriate for the monument. If the Commission wants to allow the artist as much freedom as possible, this option allows for the most freedom. If they are allowed to pick one of the three sites, the Commission may get a better design based on different and unique perspectives. For example, an artist may have a beautiful monument but it may only 'work' on one site. If this option is preferred, the site should be an inspiration to the artist....and if he/she is 'moved' by a particular site, then their artwork has a better chance of evoking an emotion from the audience.

Option 2 opens many opportunities for the artist and you'll probably get a huge variety of entries. It may make the selection more difficult because of the range of ideas. To help make sure their 'freedom' isn't unlimited, certain parameters and boundaries should be established.

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Virginia Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission

The Virginia Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission seeks proposals for a site-specific design for installation on the grounds of Brown's Island, Richmond, Virginia.

Background

The Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission was established by the 1992 Virginia General Assembly pursuant to House Bill 997. The Commission initiates year-round events that reinforce the Kingian principles, specifically, the *Beloved Community*, and collaborates with various state and local groups to promote the principles and legacy of Dr. King throughout the Commonwealth.

Purpose

The Commission seeks to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation by erecting a Monument on the grounds of Brown's Island, which is historically significant to African American history in the Commonwealth, as a permanent reminder of the many enslaved Africans who did not live to witness freedom. It is the Commission's hope that the Monument will spark inquiry about slavery, emancipation, and freedom, and educate and inspire future generations of Virginians to work assiduously and harmoniously to advance Dr. King's "dream"--the "Beloved Community"--a place where human dignity and the worth of each individual is affirmed and recognized, and where peace, justice, equality, and love prevail.

Details

- Total budget for the work is currently estimated to be in the range of \$2,500,000, which includes all
 expenses and fees of the artist(s), as well as any engineering or architectural fees, site preparation, on-site
 delivery and installation, and any other expenses that may be incurred.

- Brown's Island is open to the public and applicants may visit the island to view the site at any time during normal hours of operation.

- Completed proposals must be submitted online, via mail or other delivery and received no later than 5:00 p.m. EDT on November 22, 2013. Proposals submitted online should be one (1) PDF file and uploaded using the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission's website at htt://mlkcommission@dls.virginia.gov.
- Proposals submitted via mail or other delivery must include the original and five (5) copies of the full
 proposal, along with a CD or DVD, and sent to the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission,
 Division of Legislative Services, General Assembly Building, 2nd Floor, 201 North Ninth Street, Richmond,
 VA 23219. All proposals must include the required items specified below.
- Proposals should include detailed illustration(s), site consideration, dimensions, material(s), color, and finished composition for each entry.
- A selection committee will review all proposals submitted by the deadline per the evaluation criteria. Up
 to five proposals may be selected for further development and a stipend of \$3,500 will be offered to
 create a model. This amount shall be considered full and complete compensation for the design,
 construction, and delivery of the model.
- Once a final selection is made, the artist(s) will be asked to sign a contract with the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- All rights to the selected proposal will become the property of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Monument Specifications

- This Monument will be located on Brown's Island in Richmond, Virginia. The selected site is ???? Please refer to Attachment A for additional details on the site including dimensions and pictures.
- The design should be architecturally and aesthetically compatible with Brown's Island. It should in no way compete with the nearby Headman statute. It should fit the setting and be integrated into the existing landscape. Please refer to the Richmond Riverfront Draft Plan approved by the Richmond City Council on November 26, 2012 for additional details for additional details on this beautiful and historic waterfront in the seat of state government that also serves as an urban oasis for the City of Richmond. The Landscape Master Plan can be found at Riverfront_Plan_20120611.pdf.
- The design shall take into account the foundation and installation requirements including structural constraints. The foundation and monument should be suitable to withstand and endure all types of weather and stress from outside forces. The foundation should be able to safely support the Monument.
- The final Monument should be designed and made of materials that are durable and will age well. The
 design should minimize future maintenance requirements and costs and allow for easy cleaning and
 resealing. The selected design will require the submittal of a detailed maintenance plan. The final
 Monument should be educational, accessible, and interactive, but not encourage people to climb on it or
 use it as a playground unless it is designed and constructed for that purpose. The final installation should
 allow the Monument to be physically accessible to people of all abilities.

- Similar Work Experience of the Artist and Proposed Team
- Elucidation of African American Contributions to Virginia and American History
- Adherence to Monument Specifications
- Proposed Timeframe for Completion of Work
