

Emancipation Proclamation and Freedom Monument

DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. MEMORIAL COMMISSION

The Commission has been directed pursuant to Item C-1.30 C. of the 2012 Appropriations Act, (Special Session 1, 2012), to construct the Virginia Emancipation Proclamation and Freedom Monument, a permanent 12-foot monument celebrating the emancipation of slaves and freedom, which will be located on Brown's Island in Richmond. The Commission is requesting public nominations of male and female African American Virginians from the period before Emancipation through 1865, which includes the great African kingdoms and slavery through Emancipation, and the period during the struggle for Freedom (1866-1970), including Reconstruction, Black Codes, Jim Crow, and the Civil Rights Movement.

Criteria for Recognition of Virginians on Monument

- Must have been a native Virginian or have lived a great portion of his/her life in Virginia
- Must be known and recognized as a Virginian
- Must have achieved or contributed in a significant manner while living in Virginia
- Must have demonstrated notable achievement, made a significant contribution, or set an important example within his/her chosen field of endeavor, region, or at the state or national level
- Significance will be assessed within the context of what was customary for an African American male or female to have achieved or contributed in the context of the particular time, place, and circumstances in which they lived or worked.
- Consideration will be given to the geographical representation of African Americans in Virginia history from the period before Emancipation (pre-1619-1865) and the period during the struggle for Freedom (1866-1970) and to the full range of backgrounds, disciplines, and fields of endeavor in which such persons were involved.

Nominations will be accepted between September 1, 2016 and March 31, 2017.



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Virginia Emancipation Proclamation and Freedom Monument

Richmond--The Honorable Jennifer L. McClellan, chairwoman of the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission, announced today that the Commission has been directed pursuant to Item C-1.30 C. of the 2012 Appropriations Act, (Special Session 1, 2012), to construct the Virginia Emancipation Proclamation and Freedom Monument, a permanent monument celebrating the emancipation of slaves and freedom. The Commission has selected a design by Thomas Jay Warren of Oregon to be located on Brown's Island in Richmond. The 12-foot monument will include the name, image, and brief biographical information of notable African American Virginians who have contributed to the emancipation and freedom of formerly enslaved persons.

Other members of the Commission are Senators Mamie E. Locke of Hampton, *Vice Chairwoman*, Rosalyn R. Dance of Petersburg, Frank M. Ruff, Jr. of Clarksville, William M. Stanley, Jr., of Moneta; Delegates C. Matt Fariss of Rustburg, Delores L. McQuinn of Richmond, Roslyn C. Tyler of Jarratt, Thomas C. Wright, Jr. of Victoria, and Joseph R. Yost of Blacksburg; and nonlegislative citizen members Reverend Ricardo L. Brown of Richmond, Dr. Ronald L. Carey of Richmond, The Honorable William C. Cleveland of Alexandria, LTC (Ret) Wesley H. Motley, Jr. SAI, of Richmond, Dr. Kirk T. Schroder, J.D., Ph.D., of Charlottesville; Dr. Robert C. Vaughan III of Charlottesville, Mr. Charles Withers of Roanoke, and Juanita Owens Wyatt of Petersburg.

The Commission is requesting nominations from the public of male and female African American Virginians from the period before Emancipation through 1865, which includes the great African kingdoms and slavery through Emancipation, and the period during the struggle for Freedom (1866-1970), including Reconstruction, Black Codes, Jim Crow, and the Civil Rights Movement. The monument will also include excerpts from the Emancipation Proclamation of 1863 and the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution. A work group consisting of legislative and nonlegislative citizen members, educators, historians, scholars, community leaders, representatives of state agencies, and other persons has been appointed to research suggestions received from the public and recommend to the Commission appropriate African American Virginians who meet certain criteria. Eligible persons must (i) have been native Virginians or have lived a great portion of their lives in Virginia; (ii) be known and recognized as Virginians; (iii) have contributed significantly to Emancipation and Freedom in Virginia and/or the state's political, social, economic, or cultural history; and (iv) have demonstrated notable achievement or set an important example within their chosen field of endeavor, their region of Virginia, or at the state or national level. Such achievements and contributions will be evaluated within the context of what was customary for African American males and females to have achieved or contributed during the particular time, place, and circumstances in which they lived or worked. Consideration will also be given to ensuring geographical representation of male and female African American Virginians and the full range of backgrounds, disciplines, and fields of endeavors in which such persons were involved.

The Commission invites you to nominate distinguished African American Virginians who have made significant contributions to the emancipation and freedom of formerly enslaved persons or their descendants. All nominations must include the person's name and date and place of birth, the geographical area of Virginia with which the nominee is associated, a brief description and supporting documentation of achievements and/or contributions to emancipation or freedom in Virginia or the nation, and the name and contact information of the person or group submitting the nomination.
