



Virginia Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission

The Virginia Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial Commission (the Commission) met in Richmond with Delegate Delores L. McQuinn, chair, presiding.¹ The meeting began with introductions and opening remarks followed by presentations and discussion. Lynching in Virginia: Racial Terror and Its Legacy

Dr. Gianluca De Fazio, Associate Professor of Justice Studies, James Madison University

Dr. De Fazio presented an overview of his newly published book, *Lynching in Virginia: Racial Terror and Its Legacy*, a volume of essays examining the more than 100 lynchings that took place in Virginia between 1866 and 1932. The volume covers the role of newspapers in either resisting or, alternatively, justifying lynching, the prevalence of lynching in Southwest Virginia, the state's response to lynching, and efforts to memorialize victims of lynching. Dr. De Fazio described several current efforts to bring the Commonwealth's history of lynching to light and remember its victims, including the recent inclusion of lynching in the Virginia Standards of Learning and installation of historical markers around the state.

Virginians for Reconciliation: Upcoming Events Commemorating Brown v. Board 70th Anniversary

Delegate McQuinn invited members of the Commission to attend two events that will be held by Virginians for Reconciliation in September commemorating the 70th anniversary of the *Brown v*. *Board of Education* decision. On September 13 at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Richmond, panelists will discuss the societal impacts of the Brown decision from a theological and historical perspective. On September 14 at Virginia Union University, panelists will share their reflections on how the Brown decision shaped their lives, careers, and relationships.
